TREASURING HIS WORD

Let's do a quick overview of the entire Torah portion:

Monday:	Gen. 12	Yahweh appears to <u>A</u> bram; Sarai is taken to Pharaoh's house
Tuesday:	Gen. 13	<u>A</u> bram and Lot separate
Wednesday:	Gen. 14 - 15	The battle between the 4 kings and the 5 kings; Lot's captivity and rescue; Malkit <u>s</u> edeq and <u>A</u> bram's tithe
Thursday:	Gen. 16	Yishma'el is born to Hagar
Friday:	Gen. 17	Yahweh re-establishes His covenant with <u>A</u> bram; Circumcision

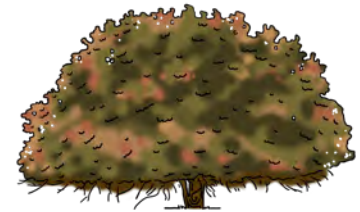
In this week's Parsha Pearls lesson, we will be covering the story of the strife and separation of Abram and his nephew, Lot. We will also read the story of the war between the 4 sovereigns (kings) vs. the 5 sovereigns, wherein Lot is taken captive and his uncle Abram rescues him. Then we will learn about Malkitsedeq, sovereign of Shalem (Salem) who was given Abram's tithe. Now, let's read Gen. 12:1-8 & Ch. 13-14.

PARSHA POINTS

- Yahweh called **A**bram (meaning, 'high or exalted father') out of his father's house (Ur of the Chaldeans) and told him to go to a different land (Kena'an/Canaan) - 11:31; 12:1
- Yahweh made a promise to Abram that (12:2-7):
 - He would make a great nation from him
 - He would be blessed (**barak**) and that his name would be great
 - He would be a blessing to other nations
 - He would bless those who blessed Abram, and curse those who cursed Abram
 - His seed would inherit Kena'an
- Abram was 75 years old when he left his father's house - 12:4
- Abram left with **S**arai (meaning, 'princess'), his wife, Lot his nephew and all their possessions and people - 12:5
- Abram was rich in livestock, silver and gold - 13:2



- Abram built an altar to Yahweh in Shekem (Shechem) near the terebinth (oak) trees of Moreh and when he returned there, he called on the name of Yahweh, showing his relationship and obedience to Him - 12:6-7; 13:3-4
- Lot was also rich in flocks and herds and tents - 13:5
- Abram and Lot had so many possessions that the land where they dwelled together couldn't fit them all - 13:6
- Abram and Lot's people began to fight between each other - 13:7
- Abram who was a very good leader, came up with a way to solve the conflict - 13:8-9
- Abram showed his trust in Yahweh by allowing Lot to choose where he would want to live first - 13:9
- Lot went east toward the Yarden (Jordan), toward Sedom and Amorah (Sodom and Gomorrah) - 13:10-11
- Abram stayed in the land of Kena'an - 13:12
- The people of Sedom, where Lot and his people went to live, were evil and sinned before Yahweh continually - 13:13
- Yahweh told Abram that his descendants would (13:14-16):
 - inherit the land of Kena'an forever
 - be like the dust of the earth, which cannot be counted
- Abram built another altar to Yahweh in Hebron, near the terebinth (oak) trees of Mamre, again showing his relationship and obedience to Yahweh - 13:18
- Lot's choice to go near Sedom and Amorah, proved to be an unwise decision - Ch. 14
- 4 (**arba**) sovereigns (**melek**) have a battle in Siddim against 5 (**chamesh**) other sovereigns - 14:1-2, 8-9

- The sovereigns and people of Sedom and Amorah fled and fell in tar pits in the Valley of Siddim (Salt Sea) or fled to the mountains - 14:10
- The 4 winning sovereigns took Lot and his people captive - 14:12
- Mamre the Amorite, who had a covenant relationship with Abram, escaped and told Abram that Lot was taken captive - 14:12-13
- When Abram heard that Lot was taken captive, he armed 318 of his trained servants to go and rescue Lot - 14:14
- Abram formed a strategy to divide his group, he then conquered the captors, and released Lot - 14:15-16
- Malkitsedeq (Melchizedek - meaning, 'king of righteousness') sovereign of Shalem (Salem) and priest of Elohim, brought out bread and wine to Abram after the battle and blessed him - 14:18-19



- Abram gave Malkitsedeq a tithe or tenth of all he had - 14:20
- The sovereign of Sedom came out to meet Abram and tried to make a deal with Abram by offering him all the goods that Abram had retrieved, in exchange for getting his people back - 14:17, 21
- Abram let the sovereign of Sedom know that Yahweh was his provider, and that he needed nothing from this battle, NOT even a thread or sandal strap - 14:22-23
- Abram told the sovereign of Sedom to give the men who fought with him (318 trained servants) and the Amorite brothers (Aner, Eshkol, and Mamre) their portion from the spoils - 14:13, 24



DIGGING DEEPER

Parents/Teachers may choose to use these prompts for further discussion of the Torah portion.

- Discuss the promises that Yahweh made to Abram (12:2, 7; 13:14-17).
- Discuss the mention of terebinth trees (oak tree) and their significance or use throughout Scripture (12:6; 13:18).
- Discuss the war between the 5 rebellious kings against King Kedorla'omer and the 3 loyal kings (14:1-9).
- Discuss tithing and find Scriptural support for it (14:20).
- Research and discuss the thoughts on who Malkitsedeq is (See Heb. 7 and Ps. 110).

Abram Rescues Lot & Gives Tithe to Malkitsedeq

Materials:

- Cardstock - white & color of choice
- Buttons with shank - 1/2" (6)
- Sandpaper - black
- Hot glue
- Glue
- X-acto knife
- Scissors
- Coloring pencils, crayons or markers
- Notebook Templates: Main Page & A (BW) or Main Page & B (color)

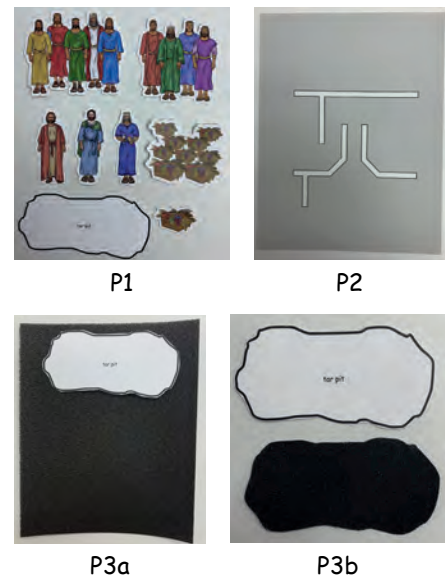


Parent/Teacher Preparation:

- Print Main Page on cardstock color of choice.
- Print Notebook Template A (BW) or B (color) on white cardstock.
- Depending on the skill of the child, you may need to cut out the lines on the Main Page.

Instructions for the Notebook Page:

- If using BW Templates, color all pieces except for tar pit, using medium of choice.
- Cut out all Template pieces. (P1)
- Using an X-acto knife, cut inside the outline on the Main Page being careful to keep your lines straight. (P2)
- Trace the 'tar pit' onto black sandpaper. (P3a)
- Cut out the tar pit. Set aside. (P3b)



Instructions for the Notebook Page cont'd:

Abram, Lot, Malkitsedeq, King of Sedom and 4 Kings, and the other 4 Kings

- Put hot glue on the shank of a button and attach it to the back of a character from the story. (P4a, P4b, P4c)
- Allow the glue to dry.
- Repeat this process for each character. (P5)

- Now, slide each person or group of characters to the different slits on the cardstock as follows: (P6a, P6b)

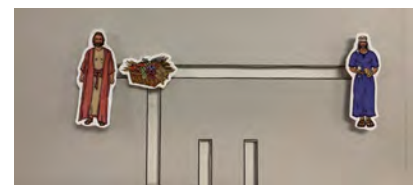
- Abram should be on the top slit on the left side of the page. (P6c)
- The tithe basket should be next to Abram. (P6c)
- Malkitsedeq should be on the top slit on the right side of the page. (P6c)
- King of Sedom and the 4 kings that aligned with him should be on the bottom slit on the left side of the page. (P6d)
- The other 4 kings should be on the bottom slit on the right side of the page. (P6d)
- Lot should be on the vertical slit next to the King of Sedom and the 4 kings. (P6d)

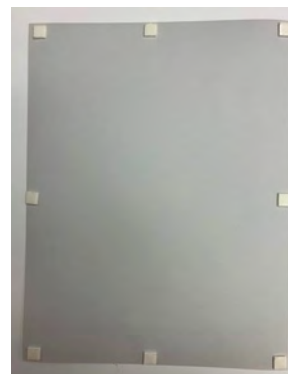

- Remove the paper on one side of a foam dimensional and place on the top, center and bottom of another sheet of cardstock as shown in the picture. (P7)

- Remove the paper on the other side of the foam dimensionals and place the Main Page with the slits and characters over the foam adhesive being careful to match up all sides. This will make it easier to slide the characters and ensure they don't fall out of the slits. (P8)

Instructions for the Notebook Page cont'd:

Tar Pit and Baskets

- Glue a dimensional to the back of the 9 baskets and glue onto the left side of the page near Abraham. (P9a, P9b)
- Glue a dimensional to the back of the tar pit at the bottom and place on Main Page to ensure that the King of Sedom and the 4 kings can slide into the pit. Glue the tar pit onto the Main Page at the bottom of the left slit below the King of Sedom and the 4 kings. (P10a, P10b)

Interacting with the Page

- The kings can slide to fight against each other, capture Lot or fall into the tar pit, depending on the scene you are acting out. (P11a, P11b)
- Abraham can slide toward Malkitsedeq to give him a tithe and Malkitsedeq can slide toward Abraham to give him bread and wine. (P12)
- Abraham can slide down to rescue his nephew Lot. (P13)

SWEET TASTE OF TORAH

This snack relates to this week's parsha. Please take these as suggestions and make necessary changes based on your individual dietary needs.

Altar

Genesis 12:7; 13:4

Option 1

Ingredients:

- Ritz crackers
- Pretzel sticks (broken into shorter lengths - represents wood)
- Chocolate covered raisins
- Peanut butter or spread of choice
- Red/orange *Fruit Roll-Ups* (represents flames)



Instructions:

Spread some peanut butter or spread of your choice on the cracker. Place chocolate-covered raisins around outer edge. Break the pretzel sticks into short pieces and lay upright into peanut butter. Cut the *Fruit Roll-Up* to resemble flames and insert them in between the pretzel sticks.

Option 2

Ingredients:

- Graham cracker
- Peanut butter or spread of choice
- Pretzel sticks (represents wood)
- Kosher candy corn (represents flames)



Instructions:

Spread some peanut butter or spread of your choice on the cracker. Place the pretzel sticks along the edges to create a boarder looking like logs. Place the candy corn in the center to represent the flames.

Option 3

Ingredients:

- Pretzel sticks - (represents wood)
- Red apples - cut into slices (represents fire)
- Mandarin oranges - (represents fire)

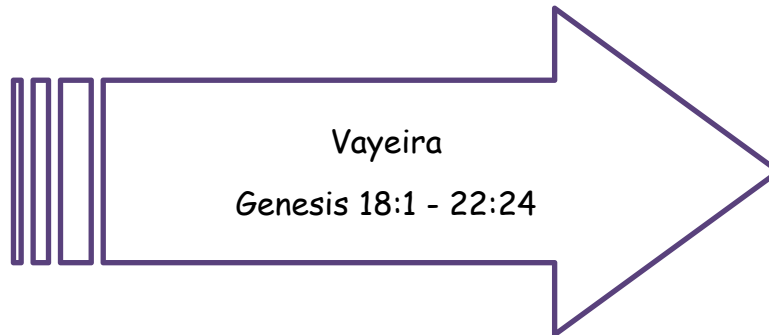


Instructions:

Place the pretzel sticks in a square pattern to create the fire pit. Put the cut fruit in the middle to represent the flames.
